Fr. Philip's November Message

The Synaxis of the Angels

On November 8th, the Orthodox Church celebrates the so-called "Synaxis of the Archangels and all the Bodiless Powers." This feast is a celebration of the memory of the good angels of God. Interestingly enough, this celebration occurs right after the American celebration of "Halloween" where people dwell on the eerie, spooky and scary spirits. The fact that there are good and bad spirits is clear to anyone who acknowledges that there is a spiritual world. The art of being a wise Christian, however, is to dwell on the good, not the bad. Yet we seem to have a fascination with the spooky and bad spirits and are curious about goblins and "ghosts," while we ignore or don't really believe in the angels. This Orthodox holiday tries to bring us back to a healthy appreciation of these angels who unceasingly do God's bidding for our benefit.

The term "Synaxis" means "gathering" and here it refers not only to the gathering of the faithful people for the celebration of this feast, but also to the gathering of the angels themselves. This holiday, then, celebrates the harmony and unity of the armies of angels and their steady adherence to the good, their insistence on doing the will of God. They are the warriors against the powers of darkness, against Satan and his evil angels. This may seem to modern man to be a lot of medieval superstition but one should observe first off that there truly is plenty of evil out there. And this evil is not merely a "lack of good," rather it is a force that is active, cunning, and creative - in short, it is a personal presence and not an absence. Besides, anyone who accepts a biblical view of the world (which, by the way, from an Orthodox point of view does not conflict at all with science – it rather supports it but also goes beyond it from the physical to the metaphysical) cannot pick and choose whatever jives with our modern post-enlightenment views. And one of the basic biblical teachings is that God created the material and immaterial world, and included in this creation are the bodiless powers, i.e., the angels.

Since the angels insist on harmony and unity with God this feast is ultimately a celebration of unity for us. It is a foretaste and a symbol of the final will of God for perfect unity in creation in general and between heaven and earth and between God and Man. As we read in the Gospel according to John, Christ came on earth "that they all may be one" (John 17:21). The angels already live out this situation and thus their form of life is a foretaste of the Kingdom of God.

One must also note that in the scriptures the angels have the special role to be links between heaven and earth, God and Man. They are the "messengers" of God who relay messages between

heaven and earth. Indeed, the word "angel" – aggelos in Greek - literally means "messenger." Interestingly enough, in the Divine Liturgy the deacons have the special role to symbolize the *angels* and for this reason they are seen as a link between the nave — where the faithful are — which represents earth, and the sanctuary (the "altar" in common parlance), which represents the Kingdom of God that is to come. When the deacon is not moving back and forth between these two spaces, his normal position in the church is in fact the area right in between them. And they usually are seen transferring or transporting things (playing the role of "messenger") between the people and the altar, whether this is the petitions of the people, the holy utensils used for the liturgy, or Holy Communion, which normally is supposed to be brought out to the people by the deacons. And all of us during the Liturgy, not only the deacons, actually symbolize the angels as we are called to imitate them in the Cherubic Hymn: "we who mystically represent the cherubim . . . "

But this unity is not just eschatological, that is to say it is not only something that we look forward to at the end. No, this unity is not supposed to occur only at the Second Coming of Christ when the heavenly Jerusalem will descend upon us as described by the Evangelist John in Revelations 21:10. It is something that has to happen now. The angels are the example of unity and we are supposed to do the same in our relations with other people.

In the meantime, the angels guide, guard and cover us as the children of God who struggle now. They rejoice at the repentance of a sinner, they transfer the prayers of the saints to the throne of God on our behalf. And, as mentioned above, unity is realized in a special way here and now whenever we gather at the common action of the angels and the people which is the Divine liturgy. The people of God on earth and the armies of angels in the heavens with one voice in one liturgical synaxis offer God unceasing praise with their logical worship.



May we imitate them!

Μήνυμα Νοεμβρίου τοῦ π. Φιλίππου

Η Σύναξις τῶν Ἀρχαγγέλων

Στὶς 8 Νοεμβρίου γιορτάζει ἡ Ἐκκλησία μας τὴν «Σύναξη τῶν Ἀρχιστρατήγων Μιχαήλ καὶ Γαβριήλ καὶ τῶν λοιπῶν ἁγίων ἀσωμάτων καὶ οὐρανίων ταγμάτων». «Σύναξις» Ũ σημαίνει μία συνάθροιση τῶν πιστῶν γιὰ τὸν πανηγυρισμὸ τῆς μνήμης ένὸς ἱεροῦ προσώπου, ἐν προκειμένῳ τῶν άγίων άγγέλων καὶ ἀρχαγγέλων. Εἰδικώτερα κατὰ τὴν γιορτή αὐτή στὸν ὅρο «σύναξις» δίδεται ἀπὸ τὸν συναξαριστή καὶ τὴν ὑμνογραφία ἕνα ἰδιαίτερο νόημα: θέλει νὰ σημάνει ὄχι μόνο τὴν συνάθροιση τῶν πιστῶν, ἀλλὰ καὶ τὴν συνάθροιση τὼν ἀγγέλων. Τὴν μετὰ δηλαδὴ τὴν πτώση τοῦ Ἐωσφόρου καὶ τοῦ άγγελικοῦ του τάγματος ὁμόνοια καὶ ἕνωση τῶν λοιπῶν ταγμάτων τῶν ἀγγέλων καὶ τὴν σταθερὰ ἀπὸ κοινοῦ ἐμμονή τους στὸ ἀγαθό, στὸ θέλημα τοῦ Κτίστου. Καὶ γιὰ νὰ χρησιμοποιήσουμε ἕνα σύγχρονο δρο, τρόπον τινὰ τὸν «συνασπισμό» τους στὸν πόλεμο έναντίον τῶν δυνάμεων τοῦ σκότους, τοῦ σατανᾶ καὶ τῶν πονηρῶν του ἀγγέλων.

Έπομένως εἶναι μία γιορτὴ ἑνότητας, μία πρόγευση καὶ ἕνα σύμβολο γιὰ τὸ τελικὸ θέλημα τοῦ Θεοῦ γιὰ ένότητα καὶ ὁμόνοια στὴ κτίση γενικὰ καὶ μεταξὺ ούρανοῦ καὶ γῆς, κτίσεως καὶ Θεοῦ. ʹΌπως διαβάζουμε στὸ Κατὰ Ἰωάννην Εὐαγγέλιον ὁ Χριστὸς ἦρθε ἐπὶ τῆς γῆς «ἵνα πάντες ἕν ὦσι» (Ἰωάν. 17:21). Οἱ άγγελοι ἤδη βιώνουν αὐτὴν τὴν κατάσταση ποὺ εἶναι μία πρόγευση τῆς Βασιλείας τοῦ Θεοῦ. Ἐπ'αὐτοῦ πρέπει νὰ σημειωθεῖ ὅτι οἱ ἄγγελοι στὴν Παλαιὰ καὶ στήν Καινή Διαθήκη ἔχουν τὸν εἰδικὸ ρόλο νὰ εἶναι κρῖκοι ἐπικοινωνίας μεταξὺ οὐρανοῦ καὶ γῆς, Θεοῦ καὶ άνθρώπου – δηλαδή στήν κυριολεξία εἶναι «ἄγγελοι» - πρόσωπα ποὺ φέρνουν μηνύματα. Στὴν Λειτουργία οί διάκονοι πάντοτε συμβολίζουν τοὺς ἀγγέλους καὶ γι'αὐτὸ ὁ εἰδικός τους ρόλος εἶναι νὰ γίνονται κρῖκοι μεταξύ τοῦ κυρίως ναοῦ - ἐκεῖ ποὺ στέκονται οἱ πιστοί πού εῖναι ὁ χώρος ποὺ συμβολίζει τὴν γῆ - καὶ τοῦ ίεροῦ, ποὺ συμβολίζει τὴν Βασιλεία τοῦ Θεοῦ ποὺ θὰ κατέβει άπὸ τοὺς οὐρανοὺς στὴ Δευτέρα Παρουσία. Μάλιστα, ὅταν δὲν μετακινοῦνται οἱ διάκονοι ἡ κανονική τους θέση είναι άκριβῶς στὸ χώρο μεταξὺ τοῦ κυρίως ναοῦ καὶ τοῦ ἱεροῦ καὶ ὅταν μετακινούνται πορεύονται συνέχεια μεταξύ τῶν δύο αὐτῶν χώρων. Έπιπλέον συχνὰ μεταφέρουν πράγματα μεταξὺ τῶν

δύο αὐτῶν χώρων, εἶτε πρόκειται γιὰ τὶς αἰτήσεις τῶν πιστῶν, γιὰ τὰ ἰερὰ σκεύη ποὺ θὰ χρησιμοποιηθοῦν γιὰ τὴν τέλεση τῆς Θείας Λειτουργίας, ἤ γιὰ τὴν Θεία Κοινωνία ποὺ κανονικὰ οἱ διάκονοι βγάζουν ἔξω ἀπὸ τὸ ἱερό. Καὶ ἐμεῖς συμμετέχουμε σ'αὐτὴν τὴν ποθούμενη ἐνότητα στὴν Θ. Λειτουργία κατὰ τὴ ψαλμωδία τοῦ Χερουβικοῦ στὴ ὁποία μιμούμαστε τοὺς ἀγγέλους καθὼς εἴμαστε αὐτοὶ οἱ ὁποῖοι: «τὰ Χερουβὶμ μυστικῶς εἰκονίζοντες...»

Ώστόσο, ἡ ἑνότητα αὐτὴ δὲν εἶναι μόνον έσχατολογική, δηλαδή δὲν εἶναι μόνο κάτι ποὺ περιμένουμε στὸ τέλος. Δὲν θὰ πραγματοποιηθεῖ δηλαδή μόνο μετά τήν Δευτέρα Παρουσία τοῦ Χριστοῦ, ὅταν θὰ κατέβει ἡ ἄνω Ἰερουσαλἡμ ὅπως μᾶς περιγράφει ὁ Εὐαγγελιστὴς Ἰωάννης στὴν Άποκάλυψη (Άποκ. 21:9), μᾶλλον πραγματοποιεῖται άπὸ τὸν παρόντα ἤδη κόσμο. Οἱ ἄγγελοι ὁδηγοῦν, φρουροῦν καὶ σκέπουν τὰ τέκνα τοῦ Θεοὺ ποὺ άγωνίζονται στὸν παρόντα στρατευόμενο κόσμο. Χαίρουν χαρᾶν μεγάλην γιὰ τὴν ἐπιστροφὴ ἑνὸς άμαρτωλοῦ, ἀναφέρουν τὶς προσευχές τῶν ἁγίων στὸν θρόνο τοῦ Θεοῦ, εἶναι τὰ λειτουργικὰ πνεύματα ποὺ ἀποστέλλονται γιὰ νὰ διακονήσουν τούς μέλλοντας νὰ κληρονομήσουν τὴν σωτηρία. Καὶ ἡ ἑνότητα αὐτὴ πραγματοποιεῖται κατ'ἐξοχὴν στὸ κοινὸ λειτουργικὸ ἔργο τὼν ἀγγέλων καὶ τῶν άνθρώπων ποὺ εἶναι ἡ Θεία Λειτουργία ποὺ κάνουμε στήν έκκλησία. Ό λαὸς τοῦ Θεοῦ στήν γῆ καὶ οἱ στρατιὲς τοῦ οὐρανοῦ ἀπὸ κοινοῦ, μὲ ένα στόμα, σὲ μία κοινὴ λειτουργικὴ σύναξη, προσφέρουν στὸν Θεὸ τὴν ἀδιάλειπτο δοξολογία καὶ τὴν λογικὴ λατρεία.

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





Rebuilding after Devastation - Beirut: One Year Later

An IOCC engineer reviews the conditions of the play area at a Beirut school badly damaged in the explosion, before and after it was rehabbed through an IOCC program.

Just over a year ago, Beirut, Lebanon, was devastated by a tragic explosion, deepening a crisis for a country already facing many challenges. Lives and livelihoods were lost, homes and businesses were destroyed — incomprehensible destruction instantly changed life for so many. Through the years, IOCC has been active in Lebanon, which meant that relief efforts could begin almost immediately — and with your support IOCC has been working with the people of Lebanon to rebuild ever since.

For example, Elie, age 22, owns a small grocery store near the port, in a neighborhood hit hard by the blast. The family business, founded by Elie's grandfather, has served the area for more than 70 years, selling fruits, vegetables, and other groceries. The explosion shattered the store's display windows and damaged its steel shutters — forcing it to close. "Many other organizations visited and assessed the damage," Elie said, "but none

called me afterward. IOCC was the only credible association that helped me repair the damage . . . everything was perfectly done." Once work was complete, Elie was able to resume business and restore his only source of income. Elie's store is just one example.

From August of 2020 through August of 2021, IOCC has repaired more than 545 homes and apartments, more than 125 small businesses, two hospitals, seven primary health centers, five schools, one Sunday School, and its educational facilities. Within hours after the blast, IOCC was also distributing much-needed food aid. Amal, for example, is 70 years old and lives alone. When the explosion destroyed the doors and windows of her apartment, she had no family to support her. IOCC's community kitchen supplied her with three hot meals a week. "You are the only organization that helped me and asked about me, and I can't thank you enough," she said. In the one-year period following the explosion, IOCC provided weekly hot meals for more than 1,300 families in need.

Mother of three Nada, 36, also received food rations. In this case, IOCC's school snacks program supplied food to children at home when schools remained closed during the COVID-19 pandemic. "We cannot buy vegetables, bread, meat, or chicken," Nada said. "The rations are helping a lot; they give me more choices to have a variety of meals for the children."

These programs have reached more than 153,000 people — thanks to your generosity. Through hard work, progress has been made, yet much still needs to be done. Along with our partners, IOCC will continue working with the people of Beirut toward recovery.



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


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
